Book your flu vaccine here at the Health Centre clinics will be held on Saturday 5th & 12th October from 8.00AM till 2.00PM for all eligible patients. Other clinics will also be available during opening times Mondays to Fridays.

You can get the free Flu vaccine if you are ~

- aged 65 or over
- have certain long-term health conditions
- are pregnant
- live in a care home
- are the main carer for an older or disabled person, or receive a carer's allowance
- live with someone who has a weakened immune system
- Frontline health and social care workers can also get a flu vaccine through their employer.

From September 2024 all children aged 2 or 3 years on 31 August 2024 & all children in clinical risk groups and ages 4-17. All Pregnant women.

From October 2024, those aged 65 years and over & those aged 18 years to under 65 years in clinical risk groups.

Why do I need to wait until October?

This is because the latest scientific evidence shows that protection from the flu vaccine decreases over time in adults. It is therefore better to have the vaccine closer to when flu typically circulates. The October start time is the same for pharmacies as well as GP surgeries.

Everyone turning 75 years old on or after the 1 September 2024 will be offered a single dose of RSV vaccine. This is because older adults are more at risk of serious complications from RSV. You can still get the vaccine up to the day before you turn 80.

For the first year of the programme, the vaccine will also be offered to those who are already aged 75 to 79 years on 1 September 2024 as part of a catch-up programme.

If you are not yet 75 the NHS will invite you for vaccination once you turn 75.

As this campaign starts during flu vaccination season and this vaccine cannot be given alongside the flu our first invitations may be sent later in the year.

Pregnant ladies will be offered it around the time of your 28-week antenatal appointment. Having the vaccine in week 28 or a few weeks after this will help you build a good level of antibodies to pass on to your baby before birth. This will give your baby the best protection, including if they are born early.

You can still have the vaccine later in your pregnancy, but it may be less effective. If it wasn't possible to have your vaccine earlier, it can be given right up until you have the baby. If you have it very late in pregnancy, it may still protect you from infection and reduce the risk of you spreading infection to your newborn baby.
